Annexure 3 Part I**Best Practice: 1****Title of the practice: Introduction of Add-on Skill Development Courses****Context:**

The college provides traditional courses in Arts, Commerce, and Science streams to the UG and PG students belonging to all sections of the society, but particularly to the socially and economically backward sections in the rural areas. Since majority of the students come from educationally backward background, they are not aware of global competition in this era of LPG (liberalization, privatization and globalization). Moreover, they cannot afford expensive courses offered in the nearby cities by private firms. Hence the college took the initiative to impart skill-based training in various subjects alongside the traditional courses.

The add-on courses help achieve the vision and mission of the institution viz., to provide quality education to the rural and socially and economically backward students to make them globally competent. *This practice of the college is in consonance with the national objectives of the Government of India to impart skill-based education to the youth.*

Objectives:

1. To empower students by providing guidance and training in various job-oriented courses; and
2. To enhance the employability of students

The Practice:

The Principal, in consultation with the Management Committee, members of the faculty and professionals in the field, introduced the following courses for the year 2014-2015.

A special committee consisting of five members was set up to monitor the operational aspects of the courses.

Time table was prepared and per week four periods were allotted for each course which was incorporated in the regular time-table in order to ensure smooth conduct and convenience to the

students. Computer practice sessions and other practical sessions were conducted after the regular class hours.

In consultation with the professionals in the field, a proper syllabi for all the courses was devised by the faculty in the college and it was provided to the students.

The course pertaining to Computer fundamentals, MS office and Internet were monitored by Yuva Jagar, Pune, a unit of Maharashtra Information Technology Support Centre and the course on Dish Antenna Installation was administered by a unit of National Skills Development Corporation(NSDC) of India, and Soft-skills training was imparted by Tata Consultancy Services, Pune. Some of the training classes were conducted by the faculty in the college supplemented by professionals hired for the purpose on temporary basis.

The college possesses four computer laboratories consisting of 160 computers, a language laboratory, a botanical garden, a green house, a rich library and a separate library consisting of books meant for competitive examinations.

Obstacles faced:

1. Hesitation and ignorance on the part of students in the initial stages;
2. Arrangement of infrastructure and space for the conduct of the computer based courses;
3. Problem of adjustment in the regular time table; and
4. Availability of skilled trainers.

Strategies adopted to overcome them:

1. Orientation and motivation of the students in the initial stages;
2. Purchased computers for the purpose and practical sessions were held in shifts;
3. Timetable Committee ensured a convenient time schedule; and
4. Temporary staff hired for training.

Impact of the practice:

1. Computer literacy enhanced.
2. Use of internet increased.
3. English communication skills improved.
4. Students were introduced to online examination system.
5. Students gained confidence, knowledge and skills to face and join the competitive employment market.

1. Well-equipped computer lab with internet facility
2. Study material for the students

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Annexure 3 Part II**Best practice: 2****Title of the practice: Student Enrichment Programmes: A Students' Initiative****Context:**

In the traditional education system, the students are usually passive. The rigidity of the system gives little scope to the students for innovation and self-development. Even though today's education is supposed to be student-centric, there are very few activities which are conducted by the students. Earlier in the college, various committees consisting of teachers used to conduct extra-curricular activities. During 2014-15, a departure was made from this practice by setting up, in addition to the existing committees, *student-fora* in several departments under the auspices of which certain activities were conducted by the students.

This was done with a view to providing opportunities for the students to achieve the objectives below.

Objectives :

1. To make education student-centric;
2. To involve students in the organization and conduct of extra-curricular activities and
3. To develop leadership qualities, communication and organizational skills among students

The Practice:

Under the supervision of the Heads of Departments, student-fora were established in eight Departments which are mentioned in the table below. Each forum had a President, a Secretary and two members from among the students belonging to the department concerned. In the post-graduate departments, PG students dominated the fora.

Students themselves devised, planned and conducted the activities. The activities were in the nature of competitions in order to ensure best performance by the students.

SWOT analysis 2014-15

Institutional Strengths:

1. The college is 53 years old and is located in a sprawling campus with 46 acres of land with adequate buildings such as play fields, hostel for boys and girls, Principal's bungalow, rector's residence, waiting room for girls, indoor canteen, outdoor facility for cultural activities, and post office.
2. The science laboratories are adequately equipped. A recognized research laboratory is available for research.
3. The academic programmes at UG and PG level are well organized with good student-teacher interaction and inbuilt internal evaluation system along with remedial coaching to students who are academically challenged.
4. More than 90% students get scholarship from 18 different agencies.
5. The management is benevolent and proactive with keen desire to modernize the need-based academic programmes and resource generation.
6. The faculty not only presented their credentials in terms of their qualifications but also in research publications, books, participating in various conferences.
7. Internet facilities given to majority departments and the Language Lab with necessary manpower; and thereby enhance the computer literacy and communication skills among the students.
8. A fairly impressive culture of documentation of the activities of the college; an active IQAC and other bodies engaged in some extension/co-curricular activities.
9. Rich Human Resources ready to take up the challenges
10. Brand Image of college

Institutional Weaknesses:

1. In view of the college being 53 years old, many senior faculty have either retired or about to retire with CHB staff bearing the brunt of teaching schedule. This situation has arisen due to State Government ban on filling vacancies
2. ICT thrust is quite low, institutional efforts to provide computer literacy to the students who are mostly from poor/rural background requires more attention.
3. Library is in a congested structure.
4. Old infrastructure; some of the labs, hostels, furniture and others need a facelift and replacement.
5. Medium of instruction being largely in the regional language, low proficiency in English language hampering the communication skills and ultimately the confidence level of the students; some teachers also suffer this limitation.
6. There is water shortage in the campus which needs to be addressed.
7. The non-teaching staff though committed requires up-gradation of skills.
8. Rural Set-up no back-up of industries
9. Students not conscious of career

Institutional Challenges:

1. Accommodating the Junior college classes in the same building poses serious challenge on the expansion/diversification of academic programmes.
2. Locational challenge arising out of dry/rural/backward region; difficulty of attracting adequate number of students for the programmes in thrust areas if and when offered on self-financing mode, with higher fee structure.
3. Challenges in availing institutional/ industrial linkages and providing placement services because of the poor visibility of the institution, and the nature of the conventional programmes being offered.
4. Growing strengths

Institutional Opportunities

1. Availability of adequate land on the campus provides scope for expansion/ diversification of academic programmes in newer/thrust areas, by construction of additional buildings and provision of the necessary infrastructure.
2. Opportunity for expanding the computer/ internet facilities and the Language Lab. with necessary manpower; and thereby enhance the computer literacy and communication skills among the students; more intensive use of these facilities could cover the entire student population of the college, with no exception.
3. With additional space/time/facilities, a good opportunity for offering several skill/ career enrichment short-term programmes, concurrently along with the present conventional programmes.
4. Opportunity for better image-building by establishing linkages with industries, NGOs and other bodies; by publicizing the consultancy expertise and testing facilities available in the college.
5. Scope for better serving of the local community by focused and sustained extension strategies by better targeting and strategy.
