



Annexure-III**BEST PRACTICE: 1****SOCIAL OUTREACH PROGRAMME FOR FARMERS****Context:**

Devchand College is situated in the rural area where agriculture is the main source of livelihood for the people. However, majority of the farmers follow traditional farming practices. They are unaware of the new technologies which are available for better farm yields. There is no agency in the vicinity that provides the know-how of new technologies to the farmers. Our college provides a platform to farmers directly and also to students with agricultural background to acquire knowledge of new technologies and new trends in agriculture. Hence, the outreach programme.

Goals

1. To create awareness about new technologies and trends in farming sector
2. To motivate students to pursue agro-based entrepreneurship careers
3. To motivate farmers to do eco-friendly agriculture
4. To increase farm yields, and thus, enhance their standard of living

Practice

It has been the tradition of the college to facilitate farmers in the vicinity by soil and water testing at minimal costs and arranging awareness camps in the villages. For instance, soil testing camp in Khadakewada village was organized in the year 2015. During 2016-17, the scope of activities was widened by organizing the following activities.

Our college has developed a full-fledged horticulture nursery on the campus in which saplings of vegetables such as tomato, chilli, capsicum, brinjal, cabbage, drumstick, turmeric and flower plants like marigold, chrysanthemums are raised. During 2016-17, 3.5 lakh saplings were supplied to 150 farmers belonging to 20 villages from both the states of Maharashtra and Karnataka. The saplings were distributed at a reasonable rate on no-profit-no-loss basis.

The college organised two day workshop on 'Green House Technology' dated 23-24 September, 2016. Over 100 farmers and 100 students from 8 different colleges actively participated in the workshop. Seven experts shared their expertise with the participants

Water and Soil Testing Centre in the college has significantly contributed in creating awareness among farmers about the importance of soil health and its significance. In 2016-17, 19 soil

samples and the same number of water samples were tested and proper remedies were recommended to farmers.

Obstacles faced

1. Difficulty in convincing farmers about the new technologies
2. Green house technology was found to be out of reach for economically weaker farmers.

Strategies adopted to overcome them

1. Farmers were convinced about the use of new technologies through interaction with experts and assurance of more income generation through them was given.
2. Information about government schemes and subsidies for setting up green houses were discussed.

Impact of the Practice

1. More number of farmers benefited due to nursery saplings.
2. Farmers were acquainted with green house technology.
3. Farmers took interest in knowing the soil health report of their samples.

Best Practice: 2**NCC FOR GIRLS****Context**

In the current scenario in our country, atrocities against women are increasing and we are aware that higher education institutions need to address this issue by aggressively pursuing women's safety and empowerment measures. In our college, 50.6 % of students are girls who hail from rural areas. The college has the tradition of conducting awareness and empowerment activities for girls through fora like *Swayamsiddha Sachetana Forum*, NSS and NCC. In 2016-17, as part of strengthening women empowerment policy, the college started NCC programme for girls.

Goals

1. To enhance physical fitness of girls
2. To inculcate leadership traits and instil confidence
3. To provide new avenues for career advancement in defence services
4. To inculcate social values and responsibilities

Practice

During 2016-17, 180 girls applied to join NCC program in the college. However, ten girls were selected as per NCC admission norms of 33% reservation for girls out of the total intake. In order to achieve the goals mentioned above, the NCC programme was systematically designed and implemented throughout the year. The work schedule of 4 hours per week was followed as per government directive.

As per NCC induction procedure, the girls' physical fitness was tested. Activities like drills, weapon training, map reading, rescue operations and health-hygiene were conducted. For their self-development and to create a sense of service to the society the following activities were conducted.

Along with traditional careers for girls, NCC opens new avenues of jobs in defence services like army, navy, air force, Border Security Force (BSF), Central Rapid Police Force (CRPF), police, State Reserve Police Force (SRPF) and Indo-Tibetan Police Force (ITPF). Rigorous training was imparted to girls to achieve the goals.

Obstacles faced

1. Girls were found anaemic.
2. Lack of awareness about career prospects in defence services.

Strategies adopted to overcome them

1. Expert lecture by a dietician was organized.
2. Guest lecture on career opportunities in defence services arranged for them.

Impact of the Practice

1. Improvement in physical fitness of the girls observed.
2. Leadership qualities and confidence level increased.
3. Awareness about career opportunities increased.
