CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 - Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

The college follows the curriculum developed by the affiliating University. University displays academic calendar at the beginning of academic year. The college prepares its own academic calendar. In accordance with this, academic calendars are prepared by all departments. The IQAC ensures smooth conduct of the programs stipulated by each department in their academic calendar. In addition, the IQAC of the college and the Heads of the departments together work on the feedback reports of the stakeholders on curriculum and accordingly provide short duration value added courses or skill development courses of minimum 30 contact hours. IQAC emphasizes implementation of cross cutting issues such as scientific temper, environmental consciousness, social and health issues, gender sensitization, national integration and so on. These courses and issues fill in the gaps in the curriculum. To ensure effective curriculum delivery, sufficient numbers of qualified teachers are appointed. Teachers follow a well-structured teaching strategy by adopting new teaching methodology to facilitate effective learning. The teaching activity is recorded in the teacher's diary which is closely monitored by the Head of the departments. Every department conducts surprise tests, unit tests and centrally arranged mid- term tests to assess the performance of students. Based on the learning outcomes which are evolved out of the assessment process, students are identified as advanced learners and slow learners. Additional lectures and other programmes are arranged for the slow learners where as the advanced learners are imparted special sessions and are provided with advanced learning material to meet their academic and career prospects. Besides, college imparts remedial coaching to socially backward class students to enhance their academic standards. In addition, to cater to the demands of the slow learners and the advanced learners, invited lectures of eminent persons were arranged. To inspire student's research, projects under the guidance of their teacher as a part of curriculum or demand from advanced learners were given. Many departments organized national or international workshops, seminars or conferences to give wide exposure to the students about the current updates in the subject. Students were motivated to participate in the conferences and present their project related research papers in the national and international

conferences organized by the home institution as well as in off campus conferences.

1.4.2 – How the feedback obtained is being analyzed and utilized for overall development of the institution? (maximum 500 words)

Feedback Obtained

The IQAC takes feedback from stake holders on curricular aspects and institutional practices. Students ,teachers, parents, alumni and employers' feedback on curricular aspects was received on four point scale with "A" as excellent and "D" as poor on various parameters such as course content, course outcome ,employability enhancement, self employment and personality development. The feedback was analyzed and action plan was chalked out by IQAC. Feedback analysis report and action plan was kept before CDC and GC for approval. The suggestions were implemented. In all the questions asked, maximum percentage of students marked "A" and very few students feedback rated "D". Maximum percentage of teachers rated their feedback with "B" with respect to most of the questions. Alumni, parents and employers made concrete suggestions to make curricula of courses more practical. The IQAC takes feedback on institutional facilities, services and practices by various stake holders. Students and teachers feedback related to facilities provided by college was

also received on four point scale as average, good, very good and excellent. Maximum percentage of students and teachers rated facilities provided by college as "good". Very few respondents marked "average". The alumni and parents' feedback was collected on the occasion of the annual alumni meet to make the developmental processes of the college more effective. Most of the alumni and parents marked as very relevant regarding the various aspects of the institution. Student's satisfaction survey was also conducted on teaching learning process on five point scale with "0" as poor and "4 "as excellent. Maximum percentage of students marked excellent for all the questions. Feedback on individual teachers was taken from students and the analysis report was given to teachers with suggestions. IQAC has created a separate cell to conduct feedback and analyze the same. The feedback received was analyzed by the feedback committee and submitted its report to the IQAC and Principal. Principal in CDC, GC meeting discuss the feedback report with all the members and appropriate decisions were taken on different issues intended for the overall development of students and the institution.

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2.5.2 – Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

The college regularly conducts online tests, unit tests, mid-term tests, surprise tests, open book tests, home assignments, project work and seminars. in addition, centralized preliminary examinations on Google platforms were introduced during 2019-20 in order to test students' preparedness for semester examinations. Since the outbreak of pandemic Covid-19 resulted in lock down in March 2020, online mode was adopted. These were conducted in two phases: first phase on first half of the syllabus and the second phase on second half of the syllabus. The online examinations were held on Google Forms. The said examinations were held in May from 26/5/2020 to 30/5/2020 and in June from 23/06/2020 to 27/06/2020. Students got feedback on their performance instantly. Counselling undertaken for low performing students.

2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

Affiliating university sends semester-wise time table for examinations and the college adheres to the same. As far as Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE) system of college is concerned, the Examination Committee prepared the annual calendar of CIE at the beginning of the academic year and the same was uploaded on college website. All departments followed this calendar and conduct the same accordingly. The academic calendar contained the yearly schedule with the dates of a variety of examinations during the year. The Committee displayed notices regarding the dates of midterm and online examinations well in advance. Unit tests, surprise tests and open book tests were conducted as per the completion of the units of respective subjects. Home assignments, seminars, group projects

and oral examinations were conducted as notified by the Committee. The dates of declaration of results were also mentioned in the academic calendar. The performance of students in the CIE was discussed individually with students and top scorers were appreciated in the class.

4.4.2 – Procedures and policies for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and support facilities - laboratory, library, sports complex, computers, classrooms etc. (maximum 500 words) (information to be available in institutional Website, provide link)

Physical, Academic facilities of the college consist of class rooms, auditoriums, library, laboratories, computer labs, gymkhana, office, hostels gardens, play ground while support facilities consist of NCC, White Army, NSS, Women Empowerment Cell, Placement Support Cell, Grievance Redressal Cell etc. For the proper maintenance and optimum utilization of these facilities following procedure and policies are followed: (a) Utilization of these facilities the various departments and supporting cells prepare the academic and administrative calendars at the beginning of each academic year which are consolidated by IQAC while preparing academic calendar of the entire college. Time Table Committee prepares class-wise, day-wise and room-wise annual time table for the entire college. The heads of the department allocate the subjects, periods and practical to teaching staff. The committees are formed by the IQAC in consultation with the Principal and the duties, responsibilities, tasks and programs and necessary funds are assigned to these various committees. The conveners of the committees and heads call the meetings of the members at regular intervals to plan, organize and control the work. They use the minute books and academic diaries as tools of planning and execution of work. The academic diaries are regularly signed by the HODs and Principal after proper verification. Various registers such as accession register, dead stock register, users registers are maintained by the concerned departments. Reports of various activities conducted by the departments and support cells are submitted to and verified by higher authorities at the end of the year. The IQAC verifies these reports and ensures that the activities are being conducted as per the plans and calendar. (b) Maintenance of physical facilities: The budgetary provision for maintenance of physical facilities is made by the accounting department, in consultation with the principal, at the beginning of the year under the head Building and Other Repairs and Maintenance. After, the account section prepares the budget of the institution it is presented before and sanctioned by the College Development Committee. The funds are utilized for the maximum benefit of the stakeholders. The budgetary allocations are made on the basis of actual expenditure in the previous year. Some of the class-IV

staff is skilled in carpentry, plumbing, computers repairs and electrification. Minor work of repair is done through them. The major repairs and maintenance works are being done through institute's authorized vendors as and when the problems of maintenance arise. Their bills are settled on verification and approval concerned heads and principal. However before the commencing the process for the maintenance the approval of concerned Heads and Principal is obtained. Binding of books in the library is done by the external agency. The maintenance of laboratory equipments is done by the department concerned with the help of external experts. To protect the sensitive equipment from voltage fluctuation, we use the Uninterrupted Power Supply which automatically regulates the voltage supply. We also use heavy duty voltage stabilizers for the purpose. Constant supply of water is ensured by overhead tanks.

6.1.1 – Mention two practices of decentralization and participative management during the last year (maximum 500 words)

Management follows democratic and participatory principles in decision making and implementation processes. Two instances of the same are elaborated below.

1. Since the inception of the college, the parking slot for all types of vehicles has been the area adjacent to the main building of the college. This however was inconvenient as continuous arrival of students would disturb the classes on the ground floor close to the parking slot. Dr C M Naik, Head,
Department of History, through a letter to Principal dated 15/08/2019, brought it to the notice and suggested alternative arrangement for the parking of all vehicles entering the college premises. His suggestion was immediately accepted

and a new parking arrangement was made on the open area in front of the college canteen. This change was approved and appreciated by the college development committee in the meeting held on 11/09/2019. This change has turned out to be immensely beneficial from the point of view of making the teaching learning efficacious. 2. In July-August 2019, Kolhapur district was severely hit by flood causing tremendous damage to property and people. Many were rendered homeless, while some experienced a lot of damage to their houses and other property. The wrath of nature in true sense was witnessed by the residents of the district during this period. In order to deal with the unprecedented crisis situation caused by nature, thousands of people came forward to help those who were afflicted by the fury of the floods. As usual, our college contributed our bit to help alleviate the misery and loss of flood affected people in Kolhapur district. The college staff (teaching and non-teaching) decided to give 10 percent of a month's salary to buy essential commodities to the flood affected families residing in nearby villages that would suffice for more than half a month. This proposal was put across by Prof. S G Nhivekar, the teacher representative member of CDC in a meeting of CDC held on 11/09/2019. A proposal was accepted unanimously by CDC and an amount of Rs.2,55,211/- was collected and the same was used to provide essential stuff to flood affected families residing in low-lying villages, some of whom were the families of the students of the college.

The college is located in the rural area on the borders of Karnataka and Maharashtra states with a vast majority of students belonging to deprived classes. The institutional distinctiveness is to provide horizontal and vertical mobility to student to provide quality education at minimal cost. The institution has been continuously adding its UG and PG courses for the students and other addon and COC courses in order to provide vertical and horizontal mobility in higher education (HE) for the students. In academic year 2019-2020, 2 new PG courses added and in all 19 UG and 11 PG courses are running in the institution to provide a wide range of variety of choices to students to enroll in their interested subject. In addition 6 COC courses have newly started in academic year 2019-2020. Most of students belong to the deprived classes. The institution has made all out efforts to enroll maximum number of students to avail scholarship for the fellowships such as Rajarshi Shahu Maharashtra Government Scholarship. About 1043 students are benefited by this scholarship in 2019-2020. More than 50 of student belongs to Karnataka and special efforts have been made so that these students are also benefited by these EBC scholarships. The college is also been availing the Karnataka BC scholarship to the 158 students coming from Karnataka state. In addition, several other scholarships such as, Bidi worker scholarship, minority scholarships are availed by students. The placement support cell has been running Affirmative action programme of TCS which is specially meant for students from SC ST
